Awards

Of the 15 scholarships for the 2024-2025 academic year, each starts as a one-year scholarship, renewable for up to four years. Award amounts vary based on enrollment and program type.

- Enrollment in a non-profit community or technical college or part-time study (less than 12 credit hours) at a traditional college or university qualifies you for \$1,000 annually.
- Full-time enrollment (12 credit hours or more) at a not-for-profit traditional college or university qualifies you for a \$2,500 per year scholarship.

Application Deadline: January 15, 2024

Scholarship Details

Scholarships are sent directly to your college or university and can cover IRS-defined "qualified educational expenses," such as tuition, fees, textbooks, supplies, and equipment for your courses.

Eligibility Criteria

Our scholarships are designed to assist young adults who identify as neurodivergent and plan to enroll in a college or university for the upcoming school year. Current Eye to Eye staff, board members, contractors, and their relatives are not eligible to apply for scholarships at this time.

Ideal Candidates

We're looking for young adults dedicated to leadership, advocating for change, fostering growth mindset and self-efficacy, embracing their diverse identities, and showing resilience in facing systemic challenges.

Preference will be given to applicants who identify as one or more of the following:

- Black, Indigenous, and other People of Color
- Trans, non-binary, gender diverse, gender non-conforming, and Two Spirit individuals
- First-generation college-bound students
- Individuals with multiple disabilities, including physical disabilities, chronic illness, or mental health challenges
